SOLAR WALK BY RANDY MENDRE

Solar Walk (2019-2020) interprets the solar system in a relatable way, reminding viewers of the importance of our delicate planet and inspiring a love of science and space in us all.

With sweeping lines, classic mid-mod forms, and a striking sense of balance, Randy Mendre's sculptures are both playful and powerful. Each piece makes a statement, while blending in and complementing the space and landscape around it. Mendre's fascination with the harsh beauty of the desert inspires much of his work. Like a sonnet to the stars, these works of art celebrate the evolution of the seasons, the passing of time with waning and waxing moons, and the fierce spirit required to survive in the desert.



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Working as Mendre Sculptures, he has worked with private residents, developers, and the City of Las Vegas on numerous projects. In 2014, Randy won the SNWA best landscape award for a resident. Also that year, Randy started 101 Suns Project, where he has collaborated with Green Our Planet, schools, teachers, and students. His goal is to add a sun sculpture in every school garden in Clark County to inspire young artists.
