

MESSAGE FROM THE DIRECTOR



Looking back on 2020, the Covid-19 pandemic brought a set of challenges and opportunities for the City of Las Vegas Department of Parks and Recreation that was unrivaled by anything in recent history.

I am incredibly proud of the resiliency and dedication of our entire team during this difficult year, from management to supervisors to our hourly staff, everyone showed by example our organizational values of being kind, committed and smart and helping build community to make life better.

At the peak of pandemic-related shutdowns, all of our community, aquatic and senior centers, as well as youth and adult sports programs and special events were either closed or cancelled. Once centers could reopen, we quickly offered families assistance with our Employee Youth Care Program and Vegas Strong Academies that helped more than 2,200 students with distance learning support and recreation programming.

Thanks to the hard work of our Parks and Grounds Maintenance and Aquatic Divisions, we set the state-wide standard for how to safely reopen aquatic centers and keep the City's 84 parks and more than 100 miles of trails open to the public. To help keep our park system sanitized during the pandemic, we implemented the Healthy Parks Program that reassigned staff to assist with additional park cleaning.

Staff also helped provide thousands of free meals to seniors and organized and supported other food drives for those less fortunate in our community struggling with food insecurities. In addition, our team helped with testing sites, employee wellness stations and supported our homeless residents at the ISO-Q.

Working with other City departments, we were also able to complete numerous park capital improvement projects and launch a new Volunteer in the Parks (VIP) initiative.

Lastly, we completed a department office relocation and reorganization that added several divisions that will help put the City be in a better position to becoming a comprehensive, master-planned parks and recreation system that achieves national accreditation and an eventual Gold Medal.

Below and on the pages that follow, please see some highlights from the past year that were made possible by the dedication of our past and present staff members, the Las Vegas City Council, the Parks and Recreation Advisory Commission, boards and committees, partners, sponsors and volunteers, and to our great community, thank you for your support of the Department of Parks and Recreation in 2020!



COVID RESPONSE

THE FOLLOWING PROGRAMS ARE IN DIRECT RESPONSE TO COVID

HEALTHY PARKS PROGRAM (HPP)

Parks are essential to the health and well-being of our community

At the beginning of the pandemic, our parks and grounds maintenance team was stretched thin with the increased cleaning and sanitization required by the CDC. Extra help was in fast need.

So, the HPP was created by using furloughed city employees from all departments.

- 12 crews (4 zones; 3 crews each)
- 651 parks cleaned
- 5,771 trash bags filled
- 2,392 picnic tables sanitized
- 1,068 water fountains sanitized

The program was such a success, it has now continued using hourly staff. We have 41 hourly staff on the team.

VEGAS STRONG SUMMER ACADEMY

Total attendance of 2,220 (ages 6-13)
and 162 (ages 3-5)

VEGAS STRONG ACADEMY (VSA)

The fall program was created in response to the Clark County School District's decision to not open schools for the fall semester. Participants received virtual learning support as well as arts, cultural and recreational experiences.

The goal was to never turn away a child for inability to pay. Through Clark County and the CARES Act, children who met specific criteria were able to attend the program at 100% no cost. We were also able to offer another tier of assistance at 50% thru the department's Financial Assistance Fund.

The program was offered at six city facilities and we partnered with the Clark County Library District for an additional four sites.

MAYOR'S FUND FOR LAS VEGAS LIFE

We've been fortunate to have the ongoing support of the Mayor's Fund to assist with both our flag football skills clinics and Vegas Strong Summer Academy – both programs severely impacted by this pandemic in terms of how many youth can participate given the current capacity restrictions and physical distancing requirements.

Through the generous financial aid provided by this fund, 54 youth participated in our flag football skills clinics and 256 youth in our summer program – youth who otherwise would not have been able to attend.







Adaptive Division



PARKS AND GROUNDS MAINTENANCE (PGM)

The Parks and Grounds Maintenance Division is responsible for all of our city of Las Vegas parks, and publicly owned landscapes associated with CLV facilities and Right of Ways.

This includes the care and maintenance of all park upkeep, irrigation scheduling and repair, mowing and sports field maintenance and over seed, producing tournament quality sports fields consistently on an annual basis. Staffing of this section is currently at 140 with 106 FTEs and 34 hourly staff.

The Facilities/Trades section of the division is responsible for all inspection, preventative maintenance and construction upgrades to all park features including playgrounds, shade structures, water play areas, restrooms, walking paths, etc. Staffing of this section is currently 14 FTEs

As a Division, PGM manages \$10M in contract services that include tree maintenance, median landscape maintenance and synthetic turf maintenance.

By the numbers:

URBAN FORESTRY

Tree Nursery

The Urban Forestry section of the Division is responsible for the care, replacement and tracking of a current total inventory of 49K trees with an estimated value of \$500M. A major function of this section, with an emphasis on species diversity is the development and ongoing operation of our forestry nurseries at the east and west service centers. These nurseries are capable of producing 900-1000 3-4' caliper trees annually, enough trees to support inventory replenishment efforts at an expected 2% annual mortality rate and with future expansion of these efforts, provide trees for all CLV projects. Staffing of this section is currently 3 with 1 FTE and 2 Hourly staff

WARD 1 WOOFER PARK RENOVATION

Completed March 2020

The park underwent a \$1.9 million renovation. This very active park is located with surrounding neighborhoods and an elementary school.

BILL BRIARE PARK NFC FITNESS COURT

We partnered with the National Fitness Campaign (NFC) to install the first NFC fitness court in the city.

The Fitness Court is a state-of-the-art, digitally connected platform for adults of all ages and abilities to develop healthy habits and maintain long-term wellness. The fitness court has seven stations for weight resistance workouts. The court is located in a heavily used park that is located off the Bonanza Trail.

Staff has been trained and certified as instructors specifically for the NFC fitness court. Programs will be offered for individual and group instruction.




BAKER PARK RENOVATION

The Las Vegas Senior Center and Dula Gymnasium are now combined into a multi-generational center. Dula Community Center is now home to the Department of Parks and Recreation administration, special events, adaptive recreation and municipal sports unit. The center was used for the Isolation and Quarantine Emergency Management Team headquarters for all jurisdictions as well as the employee and essential worker youth care program during the beginning stages of the COVID restrictions. It is currently home to the Vegas Strong Adaptive Academy and is one of the first centers to begin offering programs to the public and veterans in the community.
